The Equal Rights Amendment Get Educated, Agitated, and Activated – It's time to Publish!

The Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was first introduced in Congress in 1923, three years after the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote. Congress took almost fifty years to adopt it in 1972, and the states took almost as long to ratify it. In January 2020, Virginia became the final state needed to ratify the amendment, and it is still not published! Time to get educated, agitated, and activated to get it across the finished line.

The ERA was first introduced in 1923, 3 years after women got the vote with the passing of the 19th Amendment:
